My father used to tell me that I had the best of both worlds; child of a large family, parent of a small one.

Senior pupils participated in the Worcestershire National Citizen Service (NCS). NCS is designed to take participants out of their comfort zone, testing their fears at a PGL camp and battling their nerves with public speaking.



The Young Enterprise team won Best Company at the Area Final as well as Best Report and Best Presentation. Team 'GECO' made and sold eco-friendly upcycled products at craft fairs and local markets.

The Chamber Choir's annual visit to sing Evensong in the UK's great cathedrals took them to Bristol this year. They performed responses by Richard Ayleward, the evening canticles by Jon Stainer in E flat and Edvard Grieg's a cappella setting of *Ave Maris Stella*.



A contingent of three hundred and forty cadets were on Parade for the Lent term's Biennial Inspection by Group Captain Stirrat.



Four teams of Sixth Form students were charged with the task of acting as consultants for the UK, ahead of the EU Referendum. The groups presented their ideas to a panel of judges, in front of a packed audience of parents, staff members and OBs.

Cookes

Old Bromsgrovians **Matthew Taylor** and **Digby, Lord Jones of Birmingham KB** arrived at Bromsgrove School on 10th February 1966 to sit their Foundation Scholarship exam in the Old Chapel, exactly 50 years ago this year.

On his schooling and professional career, Matthew says, "On arrival at the School, I spent two years at Cobham House, followed by five years in the Senior School – Cookes and Walters Houses. In my last year, I became Head of House and Under Officer of the CCF.



In 1973, I took up an exhibition at Worcester College, Oxford for four years where I read Greats and went on to the Civil Service, where I spent three and a half years in tax policy and management at what was then the Inland Revenue in Somerset House. In 1977, I also took up a commission in the Royal Artillery Territorial Army where I served for seventeen years alongside my civilian career receiving the TD in 1991.

In 1981, I began my training as a Chartered Accountant with what is now KPMG in London, where I remained for twenty-two years becoming Director, Insurance Tax in 1996. Whilst there, I met Liz and we have now been married for twenty-eight years.

In 2003, I moved to what is now EY as a partner continuing to specialise in insurance taxation in London for another twelve years. I retired there on 31st May 2015. Last September I joined Pinsent Masons in London and again focussed on insurance and tax.

In addition to being a Trustee of the Bromsgrove School Foundation, I am Trustee of two military charities and continue to have a close involvement with Worcester College, Oxford."



Digby writes, "I arrived at Cobham House which was the new home of Bromsgrove Preparatory School in September of 1966. I moved from there to the Senior School with an Open Scholarship, won that Summer, 1969.

I was Head Boy at Bromsgrove and received my Hockey Cap, having won my Rugby Colours during the Michaelmas term. I was in Cookes House and then when it divided, in Walters House. I left Bromsgrove in March of 1974. I won a place to read Law at University College, London. I joined the Royal Navy on a University Cadetship in April 1974. By June 1977 I had obtained my Law Degree and I left the RN, achieving my Solicitors' Professional Exams in 1978, when I took Articles with Edge & Ellison in Birmingham.

I rose through the ranks, becoming Deputy Senior Partner in 1990 and Senior Partner in 1994. In 1998, I joined KPMG as Vice-Chairman of Corporate Finance. In January 2000, I became Director-General of the Confederation of British Industry, was knighted for Services to Business & Charity in 2005, and left in 2006. In 2007, I became Minister of State for Trade & Investment, became a non-aligned Member of the House of Lords taking the title Digby, Lord Jones of Birmingham KB.

Since 2009, having left Government, I have developed a portfolio of Company Chairmanships, Corporate Advisory positions and many Senior roles in the voluntary sector. I have written a book (Fixing Britain) which sold 12,500 copies and also made the BBC TV series, Troubleshooter. I deliver speeches and lectures around the world, and I appear often on radio and TV, as well as write for newspapers. I am Chairman of Governors at Stratford-upon-Avon College of Education, and a Trustee of the Bromsgrove School Foundation. I have been married to Pat for 25 years and we live in the village where Shakespeare was married, some three miles from Stratford-upon-Avon."

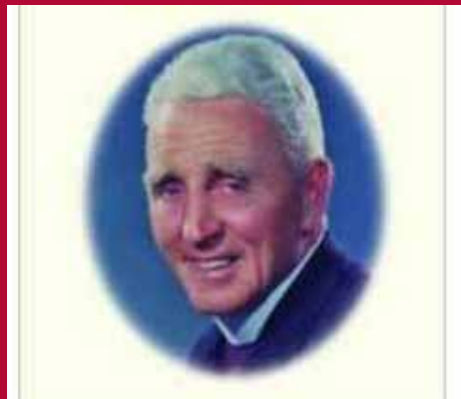

Staff News

Two former Bromsgrove School coaches were flying high with their respective National sides at the Rio 2016 Olympics this summer.

Craig Parnham (Head Coach for USA Women's hockey) was Bromsgrove's 1st team girls' coach in the 1990s and later Director of Hockey until 2004. During that time, he led Great Britain to two Olympic Games with the Men's hockey team and still found time to coach numerous pupils to the indoor and outdoor National Championships five years in a row. Such School teams included future England and Olympic hopefuls Jennie Bimson, Lucilla Wright and Sally Walton. Craig himself represented England and Great Britain 115 times.

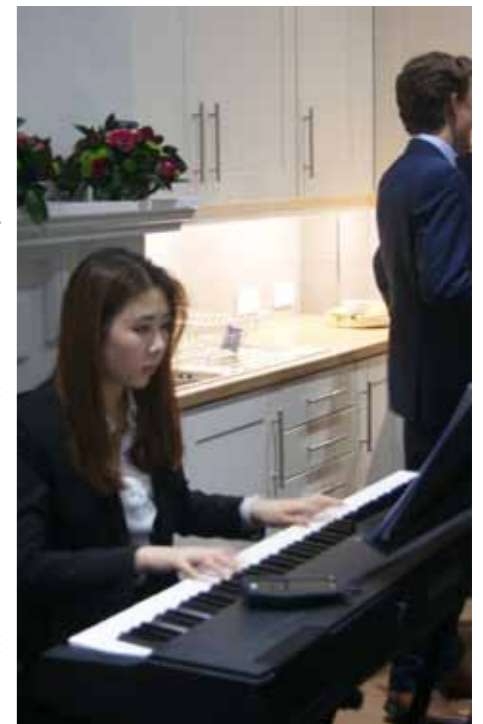
Michael was a very supportive Governor and Chairman of the Education Committee for much of the 1990s. Latterly, he was a Vice-President.

It does not necessarily have to be of a strictly charitable nature, although it's always preferable for it to be selfless and to benefit a community in some way. It might, for instance, involve conservation, historical/archaeological investigation or social work of some kind.

Marie has shared her experiences over the year with us and we hope it will inspire members of the Upper Sixth to apply in future years.

Here's Marie's story:

"I'm experiencing my biggest adventure in Costa Rica. I am living with a host family which gives me a great opportunity to learn about the culture. I'm volunteering in a local primary school and assisting the English teacher. The school starts at 7.00am which is quite early compared to schools in the UK. In total, there are six classes and 95 students. The students are between six and twelve years old. I have been singing, drawing and playing games with the children.

During the weekends, I'm travelling with my friends. I have seen waterfalls, volcanoes and the wildlife. Monkeys, snakes, dolphins, tarantulas and many more animals have crossed my path.

I've had the chance to visit an Animal Rescue Centre and I have hiked up the volcano Concepción in Nicaragua which was the hardest challenge, but also one of the greatest achievements. A gap year is a great opportunity to step out of your comfort zone.

I met up with my friend Marie Heller, also an Old Bromsgrovian, for part of my trip. We travelled together to La Fortuna, hiked the Cerro Chato and saw the Arenal Volcano. It is really a coincidence that we were volunteering at the same time in the same country. I wonder where I will meet other Old Bromsgrovians in the future?"

Blue Plaque

In 1996 **The Housman Society**, in conjunction with Bromsgrove District Council, placed blue plaques on five buildings associated with A.E. Housman, the English classical scholar and poet who is famous for *A Shropshire Lad*. In recent years these plaques have become rather faded, and so with Bromsgrove School carrying out an extensive refurbishment of Thomas Cookes House, the Society offered to provide a top quality replacement.

In A. E. Housman's day, Cookes House and the Chapel (now the Old Chapel) were the heart of Bromsgrove School. Now a listed building, the House has been fully renovated by Architects, Robothams, as part of the Worcester Road School's Day House project, the objective of which is to keep all historic buildings within the campus in good condition.

The blue plaque was made by the Whitby firm, Croft Castings, who also made the plaque erected on Laurence Housman's home in Street, Somerset last summer. The other plaques in Bromsgrove are on Housman Hall (Housman's birthplace, which is now also part of Bromsgrove School), the wall outside the Clock House and at the bottom of the path up to the Parish Church called Adams Steps.

Bromsgrove School has a longstanding relationship with The Housman Society which the Headmaster, Peter Clague is proud to continue. The School offers its thanks to the Society for their continued support and generous contribution of the new plaque, which adorns the oldest building at Bromsgrove School with pride.

David Chowen (Broom/Lupton 1959-1965) commented that Lardy cakes were on offer during his schooldays - "But only in Autumn and Spring terms, and you needed to be in Physics or Chemistry blocks to be in with a chance of getting one!"

Guy Shirra's (Gordon 1960-1965) favourite tippie from the School Shop was "Coke and Ice Cream" and even as late as the 1980s, Gavin Catlow-Hawkins (Gordon 1982-1985) still remembers the Shop selling coca-cola in vintage bottles to its pupils.

Hot dogs seem to have been a popular choice, with Martin Tyrie (Lupton 1966-1971) describing them as "delicious".

John Hitchon (Broom/Elmshurst 1955-1959) is perhaps not so complimentary, remembering "cold doughnuts and sandwich spread to eat." - We wonder what our pupils today would think about that?!

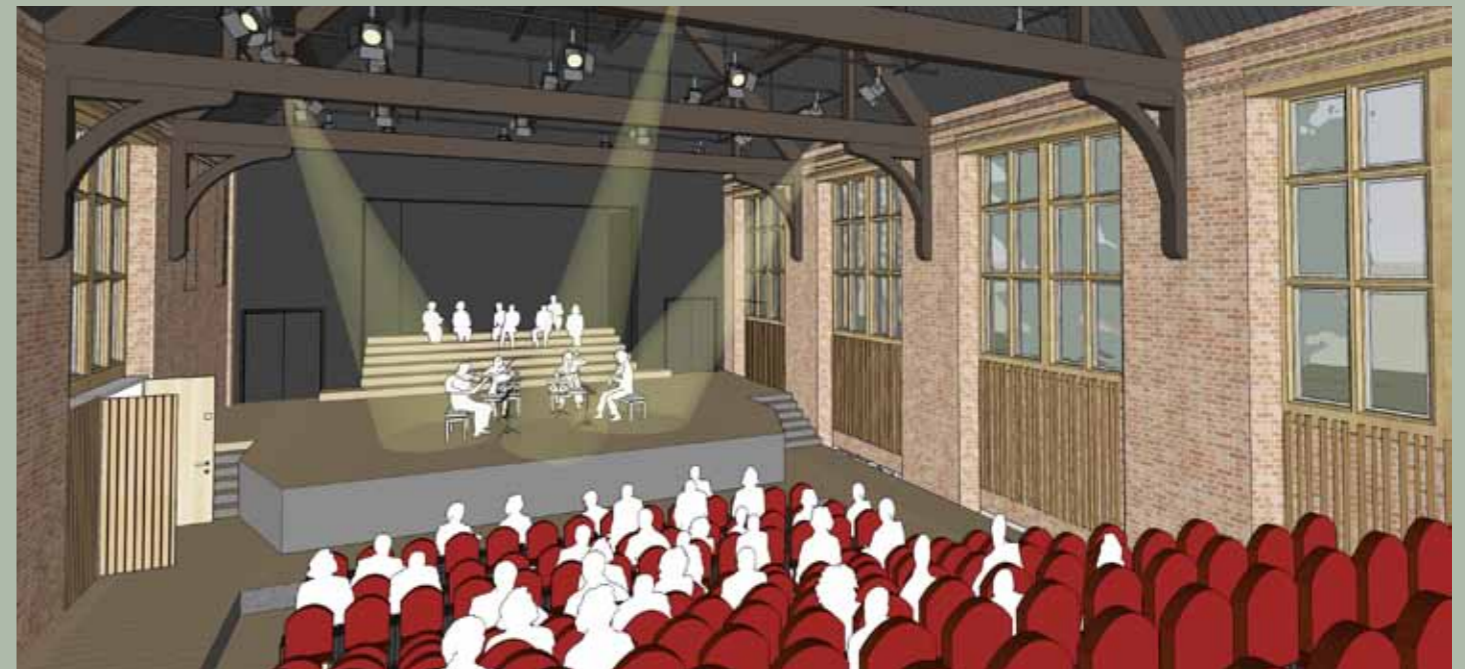


Alumni Ambassadors

Performing Arts

Construction of Bromsgrove School's new performing arts complex is now firmly underway.

Two distinct 300+ seat theatres are being created, linked by an avenue which also connects the Preparatory and Senior Schools.

Historic Routh Hall on the Senior campus will be transformed into a concert hall, tuned exclusively for musical performances and making use of its exceptional acoustic qualities. Adjacent, a new Music School will house a suite of specialist classrooms, recording studios and instrumental practice rooms, as well as a reception foyer and box office.

The Performing Arts Avenue will then lead to an equivalent home for Drama, built where the old Cobham Hall once stood in the Preparatory School. Flexible seating and a hydraulic thrust stage will allow for a wide range of dramatic and dance performances.

From intimate plays to large scale productions, the new facility will provide fully equipped technical galleries and safe access to all lighting and flying facilities, encouraging students into technical aspects of theatre as well as performance. The facility will also boast a 90-seat Performance Studio, with large scenic workshops, props stores and modern dressing rooms available for both lessons and productions.

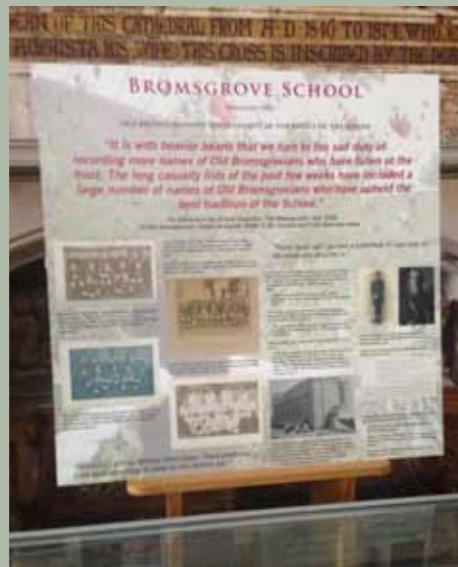
From the Archives...

School Archivist, **Nikki Thorpe** looks back on the year in the School Archives and what has been happening in the Old Chapel...

My first year of being School Archivist at Bromsgrove School has been a voyage of discovery in more ways than one, all of them wonderful!

A key role has been the preservation and conservation of the many fantastic items in the archive which has included the repackaging of vulnerable documents and the digitisation of photographs from Houses, Old Chapel and public buildings to make high quality copies available for display without risk of fading originals.

I have also recovered many items from Houses and basements and located a few things that were thought to be missing including the 'School Book' mentioned by Icely in *Bromsgrove School through Four Centuries*, which is our earliest book (1693) relating to the School's History. It details the 'charitable gift' paid by Sir Thomas Cookes, Baronet 'for the Free Schools of Bromsgrove' and also contains a copy of Thomas Cookes' Will. Members of Bromsgrove History Society visited in July 2016 to use it to research the Blue Coat Scholars and information from the book was then presented to the Society's Summer School. It is currently on display in the Headmaster's Dining Room.

Raising the profile of the School Archive beyond the immediate School community has proved successful with two external exhibitions. In June, items from our archive giving an overview of school life was loaned to Bromsgrove Library for a three-month exhibition about School Days in Worcestershire.

In July 2016 we put together an exhibition board of Bromsgrove's role in the Battle of the Somme using School archive material and this was displayed at the Worcester Cathedral Somme Commemorations where over 500 people attended a service and an exhibition. During August 2016, over 1400 people visited Worcester Cathedral, many of whom saw the exhibition and feedback has been plentiful and very complimentary.

There has been an ongoing accession of new items to the archive, both in the capture of current events through creating a digital archive of photographs, video and oral histories and digitally born documents, and through generous donations from Old Bromsgrovians of physical items such as photographs, School magazines and sports reports, uniform, trophies, badges and even recordings of chapel services on vinyl and cinefilm footage of school life in the 1960s. Please do keep these deposits coming as it is these personal collections which breathe life into the formal institutional records.

Video History recordings are continuing at alumni events with sixteen recordings made at the 1960-1969 Leavers' Reunion on 10th September 2016. There is also a plan to begin recording Sixth Form student school life recollections from the start of the next calendar year, to go alongside the existing year book photos and hopes and aspirations from leavers of the School.

Archive Club began during the Michaelmas term for Bromsgrove Service students, where pupils in Years 10-12 are learning archive skills of preservation, cataloguing and documenting in order to preserve and display archive material to the wider School community. They are also enjoying being responsible for the #ThrowbackThursday tweet on the School's Twitter account and finding, to their surprise, some resonance in accounts of School life by their forebears detailed in the student magazine *The Hornet* from the early 1900s.

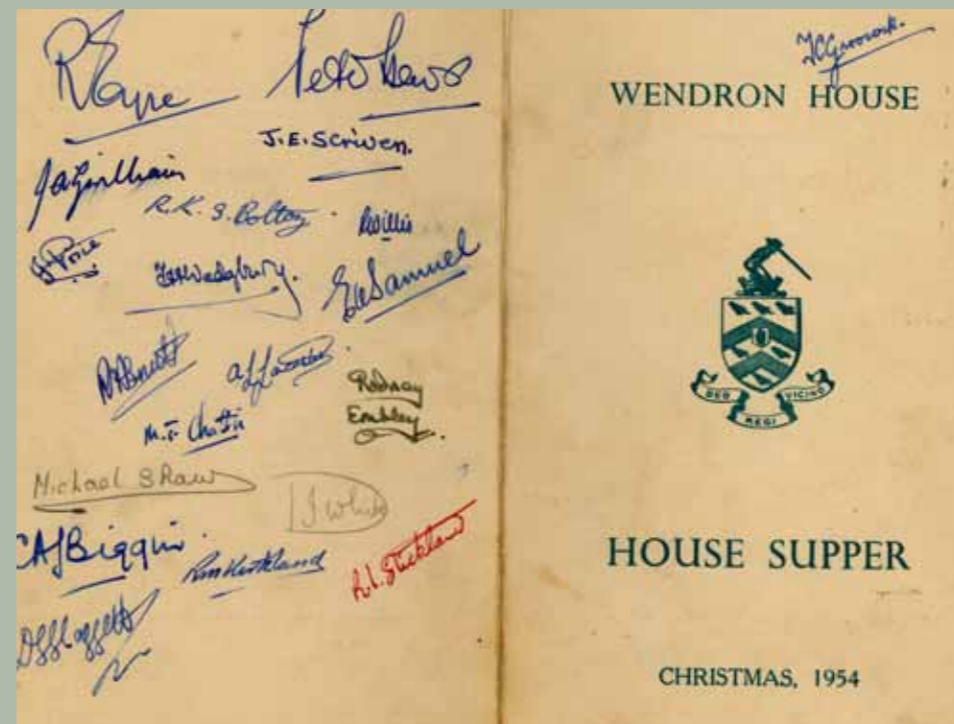

The Inside Story

AN IN-DEPTH LOOK AT WHAT OUR OLD BROMSGROVIANS HAVE ACHIEVED.

Vice Admiral Ben Key CBE

(Wendron 79-84) will become our Eighth annual lecture speaker in March 2017. We caught up with him ahead of the Foundation Lecture to find out more about his time at Bromsgrove and what he has learned in his career to date...

What are your abiding memories of your school days?

I remember eight very happy years. Of course, some rose tinting may apply here, but even so I thoroughly enjoyed my time at Bromsgrove and benefited hugely from the wide range of opportunities - academic, sporting, music or just life. My Housemaster, John Gunton features prominently in my memories - for all the right reasons - as do the friends with whom I spent my time.

Thinking back, what was life like at Bromsgrove in the late 70s and early 80s?

Looking back I realise it was a period of significant change in the School: it was the early years of co-education (my year was the last to stop being just boys), there was a shift in balance between boarding and day, and the then Headmaster, Nick Earle, was driving academic improvement. So it felt progressive, even if I did not always understand why.

And was there anything that you really didn't enjoy at School?

Other than the perennial dislikes of teenage school days (too much lock up and too little tuck), I don't remember disliking very much at all. It may not be fashionable to admit, but I genuinely relished the breadth and pace of activity. But most of us also need time alone; as a (not very good) organist, for me this was to escape to the Chapel in the evenings and play to empty pews. However, I was perpetually bothered by having to wear quintessentially old fashioned summer headgear (a boater) into town in the middle of winter. Frankly, it looked daft when worn with a thick reefer coat.



What was life like for you after Bromsgrove?

I went straight into the Royal Navy as a University Cadet. This meant completing a year of training at Britannia Royal Naval College and at sea before heading to university to read Physics. I spent my summer holidays back with the Fleet, and returned to full time service on graduation. Because my parents lived in Australia during my last few years at School, I needed financial support at university (a different system back then) which the RN scheme offered. I don't think I had any notion of how long I would subsequently serve, but it was probably closer to five years rather than the thirty-two I have just clocked up.

And what opportunities has the Royal Navy afforded you in your career to date?

The first twenty-five years of my career were spent largely at sea, or in training as I moved through various specialisations (I am a qualified Principal Warfare Officer and helicopter aircrew). I have spent time in six of the seven oceans of the world and been privileged to command four ships, including the aircraft carrier HMS ILLUSTRIOUS.

Command at sea is a unique role, with the energy, skill and commitment of however many hundred people ultimately focused on what you think

needs to be done, and all eyes do turn to you when the pressure comes on. But with it also comes rare opportunity as the white ensign still has an international allure; for instance, in overseas I have welcomed on board two kings and four presidents. One of the most fascinating periods was in 2006, working as an advisor inside the Iraqi Military Headquarters in Baghdad; it gave me insight into a very different society, and I was constantly challenged by some highly educated but disarmingly polite senior Iraqi officers to explain why the western model was so much better than theirs. Set aside the ravages of dictatorship under Saddam, and in the aftermath of the invasion, there was not always an easy or convincing answer.

The last seven years have been spent in senior management and leadership roles ashore, and I am currently the Fleet Commander, responsible for day to day readiness and deployment of the ships, submarines, naval air squadrons and Royal Marine Commando units of the Royal Navy. It is an exciting and stimulating role which I relish. On the back of one job interview (aged 18), I have had eighteen different appointments through my career, almost all of which were rewarding and fun. But I don't think anything will quite beat being the captain of a ship where you can stand on the bridge and watch jets and helicopters launch into the sky on your order.

What advice would you give to pupils and young OBs starting out in their careers?

Working life is very different to school days. I think that is a good thing. But the support, advice and protection you are used to just does not exist in the same way, or perhaps even not at all. You set your own tempo, are tested by your values, and have to live with the consequences of your decisions. This is not always as easy as it seems, and requires a degree of determination to tackle difficult circumstances, and grit to see them through. Add to that the humility to admit when you have got things wrong and the courage to put them right, and life after school can seem much more daunting and demanding. But that is no reason to fear it. Rather I would hope you can embrace it, for the sense of purpose and achievement in doing something worthwhile is very rewarding.

As to when you take the first steps towards a career, try and enjoy something in every day. Clearly it is unrealistic to expect our lives to be a permanent rollercoaster of exhilaration and laughter, but amongst all but the most difficult days, there is usually something positive to be found. I passionately believe that we all have the ability to offer effective leadership, whether providing direction from the front or by quietly influencing a team; in among characteristics such as perseverance, ingenuity or compassion, the ability to find moments of cheerfulness in the tough times is as important as anything else for sustaining ourselves through uncertainty or challenge. So go and enjoy your career. And if you can't, do something else.

(Lupton 94-99) has recently appeared on Dragon's Den and set up a new fitness business. Here he tells us about his time at Bromsgrove and how it's helped him along the way...

What do you remember about your time at Bromsgrove?

I remember the amazing facilities and opportunities that we were given, things I probably didn't fully appreciate at the time. I also remember the passionate teachers who encouraged and supported me. I was in lots of plays and musicals, to varying degrees of success! But most of all my 10 years at Bromsgrove were fairly consistent and happy times.

And what did you do after leaving Bromsgrove?

I went to Swansea University and studied American Studies for four years, primarily because it included a full year at an American university, I chose Long Beach in Southern California, and it was outstanding.

Tell us a bit about your career to date...

I moved to London and worked in marketing for 10 years, which I enjoyed, but never adored. I quit in 2013 to be a Personal Trainer, which I still do now, however along the way I met Dom, who invited me to be a business partner in Wireless Fitness, which I have worked on concurrently for the last three years. This led to being on the Dragon's Den TV programme and building the iTunes App.

What advice would you give to current pupils at Bromsgrove?

If at all possible, go to university. It gives you the chance to grow up, find yourself and begin to understand your place in the world - and if you can do a course that includes a semester or better still, a year abroad, do it.

OLD BROMSGROVIANS WHO HAVE PASSED AWAY IN 2015/16.

Roger Buswell (S/M 48-52) d. 18th May 2015

(Editor's Note: We received the following obituary after the print deadline for the previous issue)

Roger was a keen swimmer and sportsman. He played Rugby at School in the winning XV during the 1949 season, and also the Millington XV in 1951.

After leaving School, Roger entered the family business. He joined the Worshipful Company of Butchers and was a very active member, especially of their Golf Society.

Roger ran a successful wholesale meat company, Buswell Meats, selling on to Dalgety and then carrying on his own business in Northampton. Whilst there, he played Rugby Football for Northampton Wanderers.

Following his retirement, Roger lived with his wife Monica in Somerset and had just returned to his roots in Northampton where he sadly died.

Sir Adrian Cadbury (Chairman of Governors 77-82) d. 3rd September 2015

Sir Adrian Cadbury was appointed as our Chairman of Governors in 1977. The same year, he was knighted in the Queen's Jubilee Honours List.

In 1982, then-Headmaster Revd. Nick Earle paid tribute to his contribution:

"I would like to add my own appreciation of a man who has taught me much and not least the importance of delegation and even, on occasions, of judicious neglect; but a man who nevertheless never fails to reply to a letter by return of post and often in his own hand; never fails to take in all the details of a problem at first hearing but at the same time concentrates one's mind on the essentials; and (this above all) a man who is never less than courteous in his dealings with a subordinate however short-sighted, impatient or inane."

Sir Adrian spoke at Commemoration 1982 after handing out the prizes. He told each member of the School that he had found his position on the Governing body a happy and worthwhile job. His parting words to pupils were that they were to find themselves and that a Bromsgrovian must have character.

After Bromsgrove, Sir Adrian was installed as Chancellor of Aston University in 1979, a position which he fulfilled until 2004.

Sir Adrian will be sadly missed amongst his friends and colleagues on the Governing body - past and present - and at the School.

George Edward 'Mac' Crichton (Lu 29-35) d. 22nd September 2016

George Crichton died peacefully at home in Edinburgh on 22nd September 2016, aged 98.

George received a good Matric aged 15 but his parents couldn't afford to send him to University so he left School a year later to become a Junior Clerk with Lloyds Bank at a salary of £70 per annum. He disliked it from day one, but stuck at it for three years.

Having moved to Edinburgh in 1938 he was able to start a degree course in Forestry at Edinburgh University. A year later these studies were interrupted by war. He joined up and served in France but was invalided back to the UK with pneumonia, and then after a long convalescence was posted with the Royal Engineers Forestry Company to Sierra Leone. Their function was to set up sawmills to provide timber for a Naval jetty in Freetown; with their knowledge of tropical botany they selected suitable species in the rain forest which were then cut into massive 60 foot long piles for the construction of the Corvette jetty. The corvettes were then engaged in anti-U boat operations along the west African coast.

In 1944, George was seconded to the Colonial Service where he was sent to a remote part of NE Sierra Leone to put a boundary around the 6000ft high Tingi Mountains to protect the rain forest there from shifting cultivation. He returned to Edinburgh at the end of the war and finally graduated in 1947. He continued working for the Colonial Service in the Northern Province of Sierra Leona where he was responsible for adding about 250 square miles of rain forest by reforestation of large areas of degraded grassland with useful species, for local authorities.

The following year whilst on leave in Edinburgh, George married Kay Romanes. They set up home in Batkanu, Sierra Leone and had three children, Neil, Michael and Trina. However, in 1955 she decided Sierra Leone wasn't for her and subsequently moved back to Edinburgh where she bought a house and lived with the children. They divorced in 1957. By this time, George had transferred to Nyasaland (now known as Malawi) and became a Working Plans Officer, where he wrote a full scale working plan for Zomba Plateau.

Whilst attending a conference at the Shire Highlands Hotel that same year he met and fell in love with Joan Bridle, from Birmingham. She was working as a Receptionist at the hotel and had moved to Malawi because her sister Eleanor was there. By 1960 they were married. This was to be the best thing George had ever done, and she proved to be a loyal wife and devoted mother to two more children, Jane and Jonathan.

A few years later George was made Conservator in charge of Game with a small field staff of highly dedicated Game Wardens and fifty Game Guards. There followed a six year period of rapid development in the 2,300 square miles of Game Parks, building roads, dams, visitor camps and airstrips, and controlling poaching. The country's three major Game Reserves, were thus created. The expat community in Malawi was sizeable, and The Crichtons enjoyed the sociable expat lifestyle, making lots of friends in Malawi. These were very happy times for him.

George retired in 1970 and the family returned to live in the family home in Edinburgh. Soon after, on a caravan holiday to Portugal, he bought some land in the Algarve and over the next five years built a villa with views overlooking Luz Bay and the Monchique hills. This was to be their retirement home, but sadly in 1977 his much loved and loyal wife Joan, died.

George sold up in Portugal and remained in Edinburgh to bring up the children. Fortunately, they had bought some holiday properties in Galloway which he rented out. These helped to mitigate the soaring inflation, and when the time came for the children to settle, these were sold to provide funds for them to purchase properties in London. He spent the remainder of his life quietly in Edinburgh, mainly interested in maintaining the house and the garden and growing organic vegetables in his Polytunnel. During the last two years of his life, his daughter moved to the family home in Edinburgh to care for him, for which he was immensely grateful.

After training at agricultural college and having worked on a farm in Herefordshire, Spencer purchased Broomhill Farm, Bubbenhall, Warwickshire in December 1950 which he farmed until his retirement in 1989.

Spencer was a Governor of Bethany School in Kent which was founded by his Great Grandfather JJ Kendon. He was happily married to Pauline for 59 years and is survived by his son Colin (School House 1976-1981) and by his grandchildren Emily and George.

OLD BROMSGROVIANS WHO HAVE PASSED AWAY IN 2015/16.

Major Tim Hayward (Academic Staff 75-97) d. 26th January 2016

Major Hayward made a unique contribution to Bromsgrove School from 1975 to 1997. After years of outdoor life in Zimbabwe, Tim and Gail as a couple relished the fresh challenges and opportunities of an English day and boarding school.

Tim was always a larger than life character to both School and Common Room - the life and soul of any gathering. He brought to every responsibility and task enormous energy and enthusiasm. He was big-hearted and whole-hearted in all things.

He played a crucial pastoral role in times of great change. Tim and Gail were the first House Parents of Oakley, our second girls' house and absolutely vital to the success of recently introduced co-education. Tim pioneered visits to the cinema, shopping centres, canoeing, ice rinks - and the barbecues and discos organised by the Haywards were legendary. They were much loved by the girls during their ten year tenure from 1983 to 1993.

Tim also ran Lyttelton and Walters day boys' houses. Did any other colleague in our history run three houses? Few, if any, would have done so. But no-one surely ran four?

His contribution was all-embracing. Tim was a teacher of English and President of the Common Room. He coached many sports but notably it was his years in charge of the U14 and U15 Rugby teams which saw outstanding success. He produced an endless stream of fine young players, well versed in tactics and skill, and who then shone in senior sides. He also coached 1st XI cricket.



He was well-known for his love of animals and birds. He kept a goat at School which kept escaping; his Rhodesian ridgeback dog was notorious; he kept a succession of birds of prey, including a Goshawk which led to his nickname 'Gos'.

When the post of Officer Commanding CCF became vacant in 1989, Tim briskly stepped forward to take on a role crucial to life at Bromsgrove. Major Hayward's famous distaste for paperwork led to an uncomplicated, no-nonsense practical approach which engendered the most positive responses from the cadets. The Corps attracted large numbers under his command and its hallmark under Tim was enjoyment and enthusiasm. He led adventurous training camps to many destinations and a succession of very successful Field Days and Inspections. He once took the salute on the Parade Ground on horseback - his charger grew increasingly restless as the ceremony wore on and at one point we thought horse and rider would be heading off into the sunset to Lower Charford at a gallop.

Today's Lower Fourth Camp is a huge event at Symonds Yat. It all began humbly with Tim and Gail initiating a camp on the site of the LRC, then in a field at their cottage until it was moved to Gloucestershire. From its inception, they attended all of the camps for the full week until 2014.

Tim continued to play an active role, long into his retirement, with his wife Gail with the CCF, on field days, DofE and expeditions. A visit to Norway was one of the most memorable of trips in recent years. It is true to say that many CCF trips in the holidays could not have been possible without Tim and Gail's presence.

Tim enjoyed a unique swansong when he led a fourth House. The School was full and in 2004, when a wing of the Perry Hall hotel became available for the School to use for seventeen pupils, Tim and Gail valiantly offered to step in. They managed to make Perry Hall - or rather a mere hotel wing - into a very happy home for the boys who lived there and to this day, the School still receives correspondence from Old Bromsgrovians who say that they will never forget the kindness shown to them by the Haywards. It was a trailblazer too - boarding pupils were back in the town after thirty years absence. When Perry Hall itself became available the groundwork had been done. It had been selfless work on their part - to move from their lovely cottage to a hotel corridor. Tim's noble sacrifice in retirement sums up a great servant of our School.

It was fitting that when an additional building was purchased at Perry Hall, it should be named 'Hayward House'. Opened in 2011, the inscription reads:

"This building is named in honour of Tim and Gail Hayward, the first Houseparents of Perry (later to become Housman) Hall. Over the decades, in many roles, they have enriched the lives of numerous Bromsgrovians, winning the respect, admiration and affection of all. Their achievements were immense. Their legacy will never be forgotten."

Our School offers sincere condolences to Gail, their children and grandchildren.

Our special thanks must go to Rachel Scannell, who immediately stepped in and arranged for the use of the School Chapel as well as organising the collection of the many messages of condolence. With Jenny Bossard and Megan Griffiths, she also arranged the memorial service and refreshments. And a special thanks to Stephen Agnew for leading us in our remembrance of Tim both at the Cremation Service and the Memorial Service. The book Megan made from all of your emails have given us great joy and many chuckles: over thirty years of memories and 'snapshots' of Tim from his coaching, House mastering, CCF expeditions, etc. It will be an heirloom for the family.

Tribute to outgoing Chairman of Governors, Stewart Towe CBE

The Headmaster offered the following tribute to retiring Chairman of Governors, **Stewart Towe CBE**, at Commemoration Day Prizegiving on Saturday, 2nd July 2016:

“As some of you will realise, Mr Towe has just completed his final presentation of trophies in his capacity as our Chairman of Governors. He steps down from that post today, having served the School as a Governor for twelve years, the last six as Chairman. I pay tribute to his wife Ann for allowing us to command so much of his precious time and for her own ongoing support of the School.

An Old Bromsgrovian, Stewart Towe was a day pupil in Lupton House from 1965-1970. Even back then, he was no stranger to leadership, having been appointed Head of School in his final year. There are a number of other prescient echoes from his time as a pupil. The Dining Hall had just been built when he arrived in 1965. He leaves having overseen its complete refurbishment.

He was a serious academic, having been the recipient of the Wattell Prize for Biology (1969) and Master's Reading Prizes (Junior 1966 and Senior 1969). Perhaps unsurprisingly then, over the past decade, our academic reputation has flourished under his stewardship.

Similarly, as a pupil he was a member of the 1st XV, the 1st VIII Cross-Country team, the School Polo team and Vice-President of the Games Committee.

As a Chairman, he has overseen significant investment in our sporting facilities and a commensurate rise in our reputation. We are now ranked the fourth best sporting school in the nation, and not too bad at rugby. Yet perhaps the loudest echo emanates from his early passion for the performing arts. Secretary of the Music Society and the Literary and Dramatic Society, Leader of the Choir, and instrumental (if you will forgive the pun) in a great run of musical successes for Lupton.



So a boy of musical and theatrical ambition. Jump forward forty years and we have a man who leaves us having just commissioned what will soon be two world-class performing arts venues on our campus.

In the intervening years between leaving Bromsgrove as a boy and returning as its Chairman of Governors, Stewart Towe has had a stellar career as a businessman and community leader. I could read you a remarkable list of successes and contribution, but amongst his many virtues is a strong sense of humility and I can already feel his glare burning into my back.

So let me just say this. Every Headmaster prays for a Chairman who is strong enough to keep them honest, trusting enough to keep them motivated and wise enough to know when to apply each quality. Over the past two years, I have enjoyed the steadfast loyalty, quiet wisdom and reassuring authority of just such a Chairman.

On this day, forty-six years ago, Commemoration Day 1970, a young Stewart Towe was presented with the Headmaster's Prize. I would like to reprise that act now and present our outgoing Chairman of Governors and long-time servant of the School with another Headmaster's Prize in acknowledgement of the School's gratitude.”

Farewell to Chairman of the Foundation, Dick Noake

We pay tribute to our Chairman of the Bromsgrove School Foundation, **Dick Noake** (Elmshurst 1959-1964), who retires from his position in December 2016 after seven years at the helm.

An Old Bromsgrovian, Dick was at Bromsgrove between 1959 and 1964 in Elmshurst House. His children, James and Rebecca also attended the School.

In 1994, Dick joined the board of Governors, and in 2006, when the idea to create a Foundation providing life-changing bursaries to pupils who ordinarily could not afford to come to the School was first discussed, Dick was one of the first to offer his help and assistance. The Foundation Board held their first meeting in September 2007 and then in 2009, Dick became Chairman of the School's Foundation following John Wheatley's retirement.

Dick has been instrumental in leading the Foundation, bringing his expert knowledge of accounting and financial practices and driving forward the Sir Thomas Cookes Legacy Society and the Foundation's life-changing Bursary Fund.

Dick will remain a Trustee of the Foundation and we thank him for his loyal and dedicated service to Bromsgrove School.

Headmaster, Peter Clague said "Pupil, parent, Governor and Foundation Chair; Dick Noake is the consummate Bromsgrovian. A man of endearing humility, in each role he has shown selfless loyalty and an unflinching desire to see the School thrive. It has been my great good fortune to work with him as the Foundation has restructured itself and the sharper focus which has resulted is a testimony to his vision."

I share the "pride and joy" expressed by the retiring chairman, Dick Noake that the Foundation can now claim to have come of age since the date it was formed in 2007.



What enthuses me most about the initiative is that it is serving the aims of our founder, Sir Thomas Cookes: it exists solely to support the financial needs of future pupils so that regardless of background, any child of potential and ability can aspire to benefit from the "Bromsgrove experience".
