Each Term, I report to the Governing Body on the School's performance against a number of targets. There are fifty eight in total, ranging from examination successes to financial performance, roll composition to social media posts. Admittedly, I sometimes get teased about my over-enthusiasm for charts and graphs, but the Geographer in me likes to look for patterns. What is interesting in the latest tally is the clear impact of the pandemic. Nowhere is that more evident than in our sporting statistics and, given the wealth of sporting success contained within this edition of the News Review, I share three key graphs to make that point.

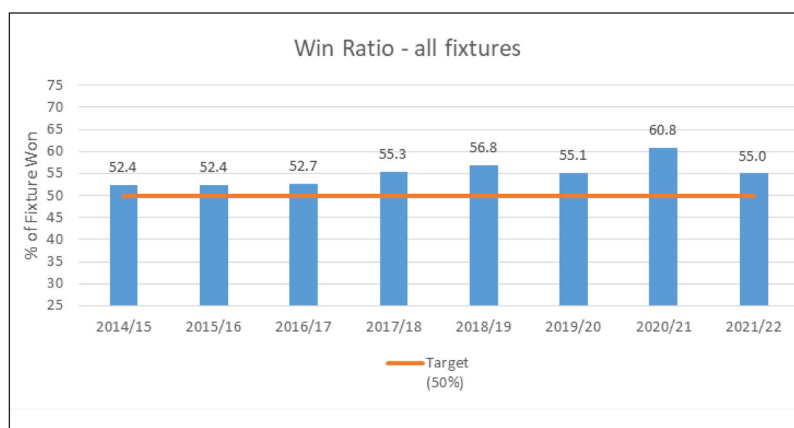
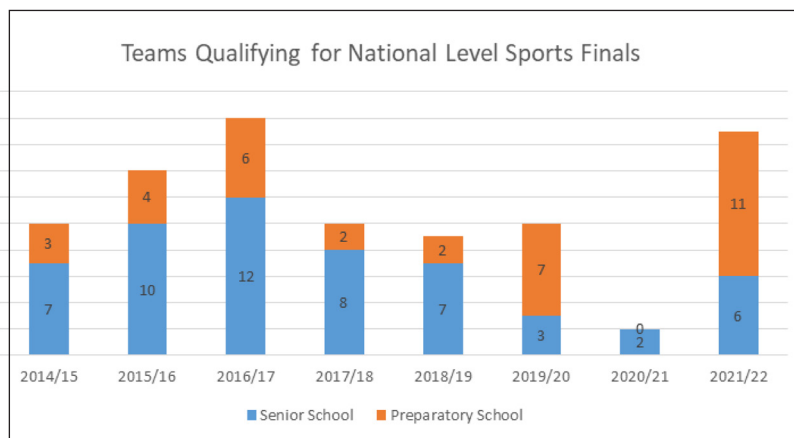
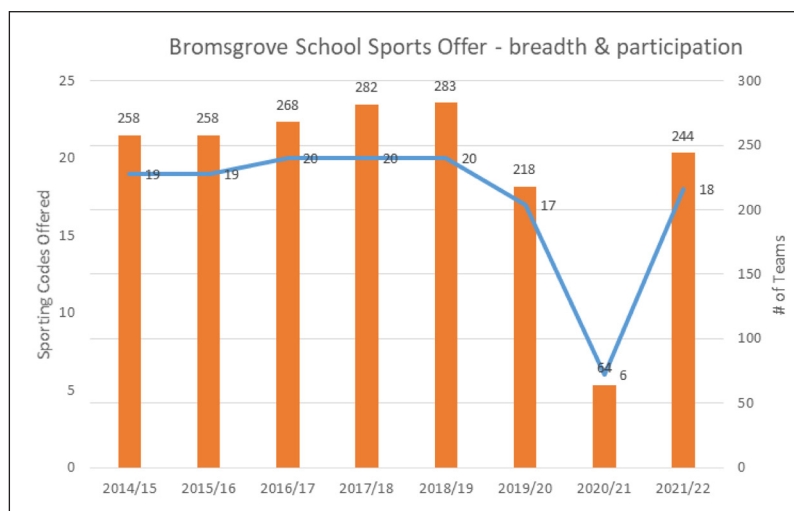
The first shows the number of teams fielded each year (orange bars) and the number of codes on offer (blue line). The COVID-dip of the past two years is striking. So too is the speed with which we have bounced back to our traditional levels, with new records expected to be set next year. It is of great credit to the Sports Departments in each of our Schools that pupils have returned so readily to the challenge and comradery of weekly sporting endeavours, whatever their age or ability.

The second graph shows that it is not just all about participation; top level performance matters too. Our reputation as a sporting force has also quickly bounced back, with seventeen teams qualifying for National Finals this year. Despite not being a specialised sporting academy, we have consistently ranked in the UK's Top six Sports Schools for the past decade.

The third graph tells another equally encouraging story, this one untouched by the ravages of the pandemic. Choosing teams and arranging fixtures in a School of our size is no easy task. We don't want our players demoralised by being the 'easy-beats', nor do we want them bored or cocky by only competing against weaker teams. Our challenge is to provide them challenge. Hence, we set ourselves an annual Win ratio target of 50%. Enough success to keep our players buoyant and proud, enough losses to spur their aspiration and desire to improve.

Collectively, these make for pretty impressive match stats, and proof that the School has beaten the pandemic hands down.

We enjoyed a concert celebrating senior ensembles recently with performances from the Orchestra, Big Band, Concert Band, Trumpet Group and String Orchestra.

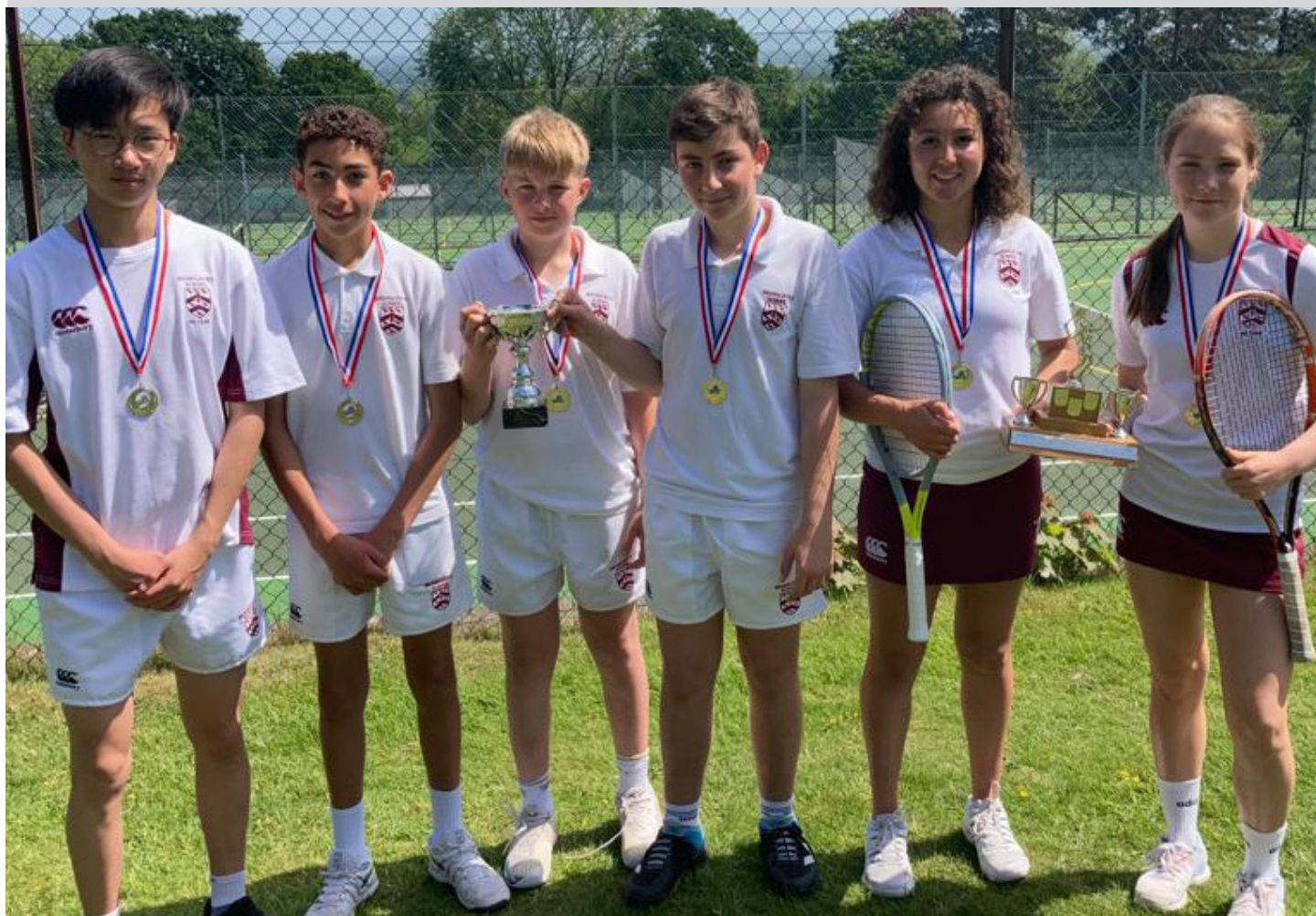
This was a wonderful concert, full of musical variety and it was great to see so many pupils sitting side by side, especially those who are now bound for public examinations.

Tennis

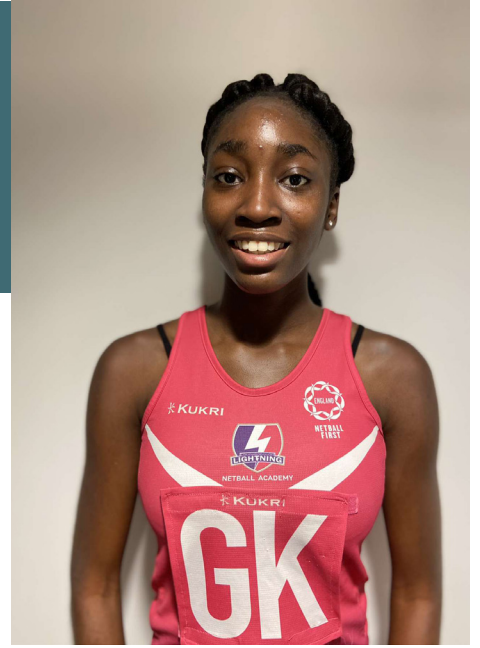
