## A Word from the Headmaster

Some 150 years ago, the Victorian headmaster Edward Thring argued that the best schools develop not only the mind but also character, creativity, and physical well-being. A wide range of co-curricular options allows pupils to work together, to uncover talents that might otherwise never be revealed, and to develop interests that last a lifetime. Moreover, Thring believed that we all have areas in which we excel, and that good schools identify those strengths in each pupil and nurture them.

If Edward Thring were alive and able to visit Bromsgrove School, albeit at the age of 205,

I think he would like what he found. Indeed, the pages that follow highlight the wealth of opportunities available to pupils here, with many young people excelling not just in one area but in many. Importantly, we hope they enjoy the richness of their experiences: learning skills that help them work well with others, making memories that will last long after they have left, and becoming equipped to make their own way in the world.

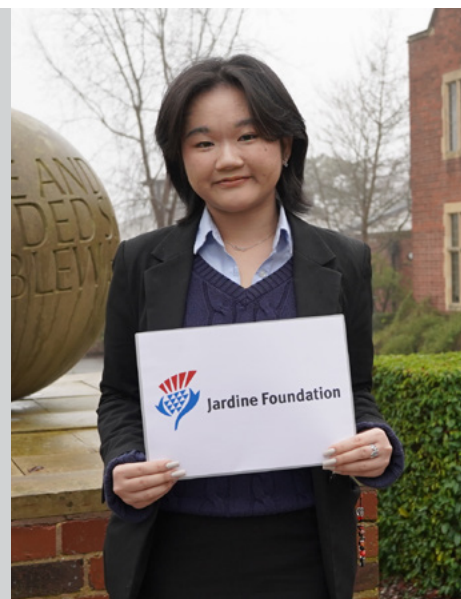


## Jardine Scholarship

## Global Politics

Joy Kariuki put her skills to the test when completing some prep for her Global Politics course. With her creative application of political legitimacy theory, and using the input-throughput-output framework, she produced a scorecard to analyse the legitimacy of the USA as a political system.

The work also demonstrated several of the IB learner profile attributes, not least students being inquirers, knowledgeable and open minded, and analysing society through a global lens.



## Basketball

After completing their fixtures, the U15 basketball team have been crowned District Champions for the 2025/26 season. The team finished with a convincing record of eight wins from eight games - a phenomenal achievement for the boys and their coaches.



## Behavioural Science

Ayaan Rauf has been co-writing a blog on how behavioural science can help shape education in the developing world. This has now been published by the British development organisation, DARE-RC, who also work with the University of Oxford. The blog addressed two questions: 'What if boosting school attendance was as simple as sending a text? Or if improving student performance required simply sending a friendly reminder about an upcoming test?'

Thanks to behavioural science insights, short, well-timed nudges have been remarkably effective in addressing education-related problems across the world, digging deeper into everyday habits, motivations, and mental shortcuts that shape how students, parents, teachers and school administrators behave.

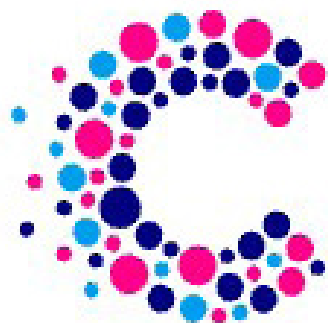
## Wellbeing Art

The standout performance was from Sam Inglis who achieved the Best in School.



## Kapla Workshop

Year 1 demonstrated how “From Small Beginnings” anything is possible. Starting with just one Kapla block, the children worked together to create an incredible scene, featuring giant volcanoes with flowing lava rivers, fierce crocodiles, enormous dinosaurs, and colourful birds which the children made independently simply by following a design. There was a hushed atmosphere in the room as the children concentrated deeply on balancing the Kapla blocks, which of course have no fixing mechanisms at all. We couldn’t believe what they were able to create using just tiny wooden blocks.

The teamwork and friendship the children showed were outstanding, and this enrichment activity provided a truly wonderful experience to add a wow factor to the topic.

## Paralympian

Pupils and staff welcomed Darren Harris, dual Paralympian and England’s most capped blind footballer. Darren will be working with pupils around resilience, motivation and overcoming adversity.





## Volleyball

# Hockey

## U13 Boys

The U13A team travelled to Malvern to participate in the IAPS Cup. They played some outstanding hockey in the group, securing dominant wins and finishing top of the group. This set up a semi-final against Moulsoford, and the excellent form continued as they earned a convincing 7–0 victory. That win took them into the final, where they met Repton once again. Repton, eager to respond after their group defeat, capitalised on an early Bromsgrove chance that went wide and countered to score the opening goal. They added two more before half-time. Bromsgrove rallied admirably in the second half, showing much-improved play and real determination, but a late fourth goal secured the win for Repton. Due to tournament rules, the team were unable to progress further, but it was unquestionably the best hockey they have played so far this term. Every player should feel proud of the standard they reached.



## U13 Girls

Our U13 hockey team have been crowned county champions. They competed against RGS Worcester and The King's School Worcester, the girls produced a dominant 5–0 victory against King's and a 1–1 draw with RGS to secure the county title - a fantastic achievement.



## School Cup

The U15A boys' rugby team competed in the quarter final of the Continental Tyres Schools Plate Competition against Barnard Castle. It was close encounter with the weather conditions. However, two very early tries from Bromsgrove ensured a victory alongside a good defensive effort by all. The team now face an away trip to Radley College after half term for a spot in the Plate Final.



## Young Voices

Over forty students from Year 6 travelled to the BP Pulse Live arena in Birmingham to take part in the national Young Voices festival. They were joined by over five and a half thousand children from schools all over the Midlands and beyond to create a mass choir that was buzzing with energy. Notable highlights included singing with American artist Aneesa Folds, who came off Broadway to take part in the concert. ## Oxford Union Competition

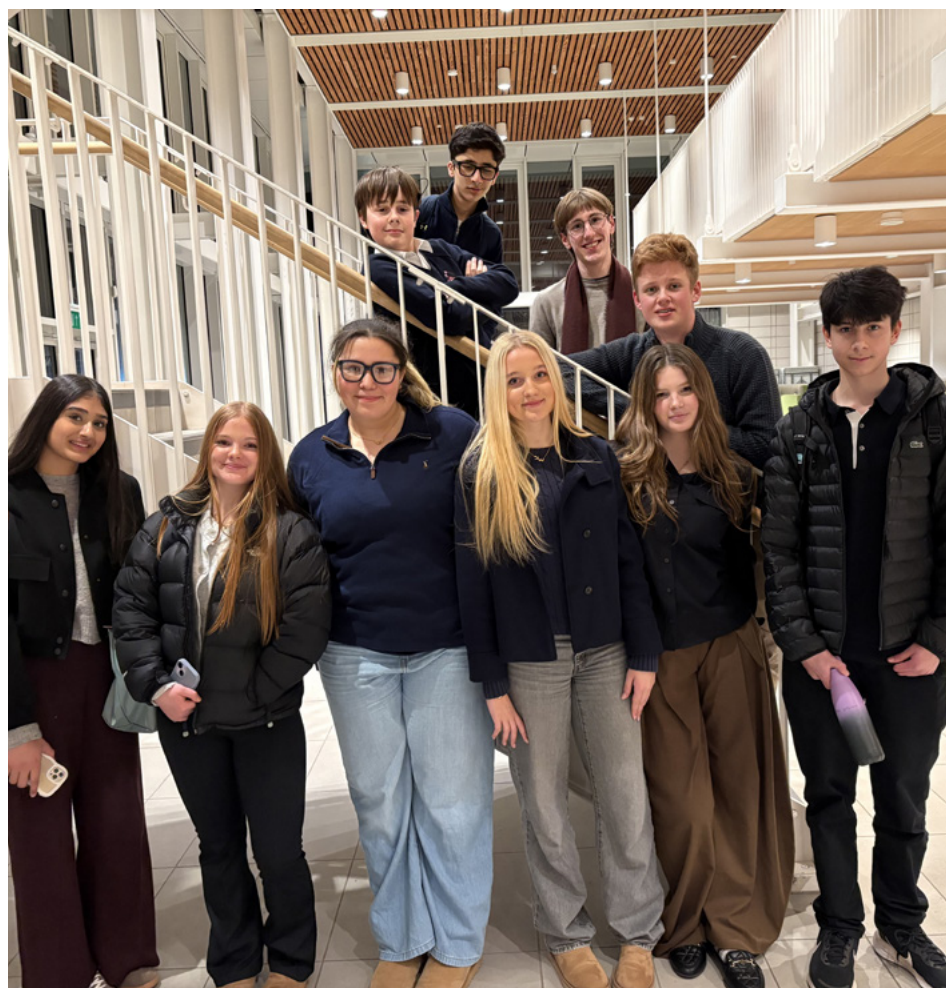
The Senior School debating team took part in the regional round of the Oxford Union Debating Competition, the largest school debating competition in the world. In a high-calibre field of forty teams, our students competed strongly against schools from across the region, vying for a place in the top four teams that would see them qualify for Finals Day. We were delighted that two of our teams, Eleanor Young/Matthew Hill and Jasper Page/Gleb Sovetkin were able to secure a top 4 finish and so will now travel to the Oxford Union in March to compete for the title against the best teams in the country and from around the world.





## Author Visit

Pre-Prep pupils enjoyed a visit from an Old Bromsgrovian and local author, Graham Jones, who officially launched the Pre-Prep Reading Challenge, as part of the 'National Year of Reading'. He shared his book, *Time Travelling Toby and The Dinosaurs*, which the children loved.

A group of junior and senior debaters competed in the Nottingham University Schools' Debating Competition. Across four fast-paced rounds of British Parliamentary debating, teams had just fifteen minutes to prepare each motion, relying solely on their own thinking and teamwork.

Our junior debaters, all novices and the youngest competitors, performed impressively, with each team placing at least second in a debate. Special congratulations go to Bella Collins-Bishop, who won a debate single-handedly when her partner was unavailable. The senior team of Jasper Page and Matthew Hill reached the Silver Final, finishing second and ranking sixth overall out of fifty-seven teams.

All students showed outstanding resilience, teamwork, and sportsmanship.



## In Memory

Members of Bromsgrove School came together for a moving tree-planting ceremony in honour of the late Namsong Rai, marking what would have been his sixteenth birthday. A special tree was planted in his memory, symbolising growth, remembrance, and the lasting impact Namsong continues to have on our community.
