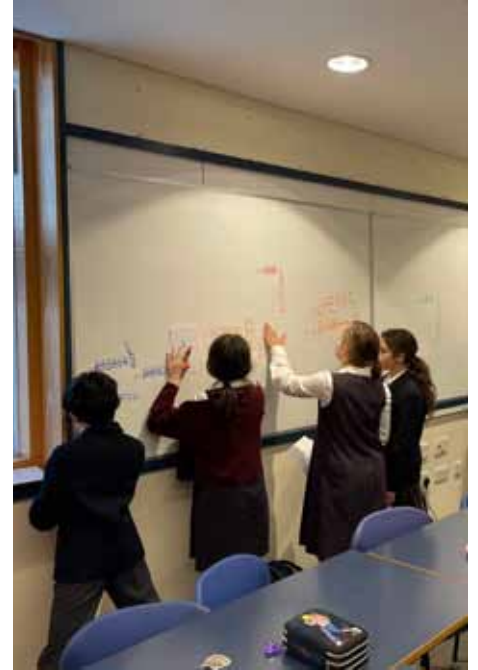






## Maths Fun

A number of pupils took part in the Worcestershire County Schools Individual Table Tennis Championships.

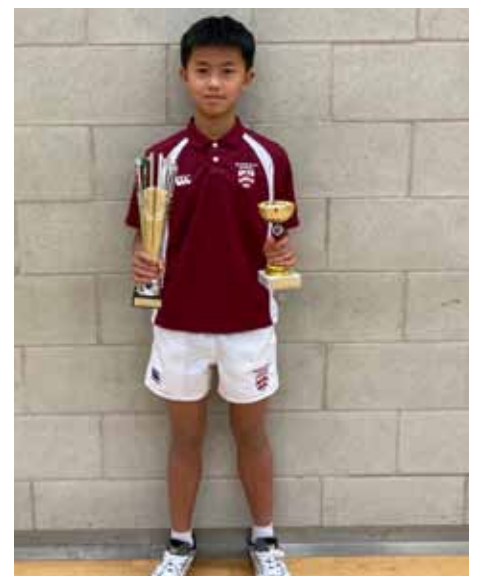
U19 boys - Alvin Wu (3rd), Alex Lau (4th), Gian Samara (5th) and Arutiun Nikogosian (6th).

The aim is to learn the correct steps and hand movements, including getting from one side of the boat to the other as quickly as possible without tripping or getting your hands twisted.

## CERN

Twenty Sixth Form students visited the Centre for European Nuclear Research in Geneva. The students discovered how CERN is helping to answer some of the Universe's most fundamental questions; how did the Universe begin? What are the basic building blocks of matter? What fundamental forces will shape the Universe's future? The group were given guided tours of the CERN facilities by scientists currently working with the ATLAS detector and were able to explore the recently opened visitors centre at CERN headquarters. The trip also included a visit to Geneva's History of Science museum, a boat ride across Lac Léman to explore Geneva's Old Town and a meal at a traditional Swiss restaurant complete with alpine horns and plenty of fondue.



## Politics
