
I hope you enjoy the pages which follow, and that they give a flavour of just some of what



2024 Results

We are delighted with this year's results across GCSE, A level, IB and BTEC. As regards universities, the picture is very encouraging; an unprecedented 90% have secured their first-choice place, and the vast majority of the remainder will be going to their insurance choice. 100+ of our Sixth Formers received top Russell Group universities with LSE, Imperial, Manchester, Warwick and UCL being favourite destinations for our leavers. Some have secured apprenticeships with Grant Thornton, KPMG and Richborough Estates.

World Challenge

Twenty-eight pupils travelled to Malaysian Borneo for a three-week expedition with World Challenge. The trip was split into three sections to fully immerse themselves in all that the states of Sarawak and Sabah have to offer; from orangutans to centipedes, 85% humidity to epic thunderstorms and lush green jungles to sandy beaches.

The challenge phase saw them hiking through jungle terrain, rivers and a testing altitude climb up to the 4095m peak of Mt. Kinabalu. For their community initiative, the groups worked with the Iban tribe community on their peppercorn farm, providing labour and assistance in a variety of ways; this was a highlight for all.

Finally, the rest and relaxation phase saw the group snorkelling in the warm waters of Kota Kinabalu and white-water rafting. The group took full control of the trip, organising activities, meals and managing the budget; with many developing a zest for more independent travel in the future.



Olympiad

Well done to Gleb Sovetkin who has been awarded a medal and book prize in the most recent UKMT Maths Olympiad paper.



Triathlon

William Pridden competed for GB at the European Youth Triathlon championships in Banyoles, Spain. An amazing experience and achievement, and he was so proud to be representing his country for the first time. William was selected to compete again for GB in The European Triathlon Junior Cup in Salini, Malta.

Outreach

The science outreach students returned to Chadsgrove School to meet the students, new and old, who they will be working with this year. Bromsgrove are pleased to welcome Ms Andrews to the team and thank Mrs Hockey for her incredible hard work at the outset of this project. The aim this year is to work towards an entry level certificate in science. Bromsgrove students will be planning sessions to support them in the attainment of three units, working as part of a team, working towards goals

and a chemistry-based module making useful chemicals.

Students from both schools reacquainted themselves and there was much laughter and discussion as they collaborated on making bath bombs.

It is great to see all students engaged in the process and clearly enjoying their time together. We look forward to this special relationship developing over the coming months.



Stop the Bleed

If someone has an accident, is a victim of knife crime or becomes injured in a mass casualty incident - the single most preventable cause of death is bleeding. Four of our Lower Sixth students - Diana Skurtu, Yannis Marinas, Rebecca Woolmore and Kalash Rai, spent the day with the West Midlands Ambulance Service training over 200 members of the public in life-saving, stop the bleed techniques, including applying a tourniquet.

Speaking to their fellow volunteers of army and navy doctors, they gained huge insights into Trauma Medicine and the lives of young doctors. They also learnt about the fantastic opportunity to gain a degree apprenticeship in Paramedic Science with the West Midlands Ambulance Service.

The team presented well, bouncing off each other to give clear instructions and guidance to their audiences. Over the day they developed their questions to make their presentation even more interactive and engaging. They were heavily praised and as a treat, were allowed a special tour of the HART unit (which stands for Hazardous Area Response Team), who are a specialised team of paramedics that respond to incidents like the Manchester Arena Attack and the Salisbury Poisoning.





Hedgehogs

Autumn has arrived in Nursery and pupils have been learning about hedgehogs, as well as making hedgehog bread. They have also enjoyed decorating their classroom to fit the theme.



FOBISIA

Some of the Year 5 pupils have started attempting to crack the code in the international FOBISIA code breaking challenge. These are the skills that make good mathematicians; problem solving, logical thought and perseverance are the same skills that make great code breakers.



Music

As part of the new Year 3 Music Scheme, pupils are on a music carousel every Tuesday afternoon. With individual instruments, singing and theory, everyone gets a well-rounded insight into all things music. Year 3 pupils have the opportunity to learn a string, woodwind and brass instrument, and some are even continuing their instrument from Pre-Prep.





Cricket

Year 8 pupil Oliver Whitehouse has been hailed a “young cricketing superstar” after bowling out six players in a row, in one over, during an U12 game against Cookhill. Oliver plays for Bromsgrove Cricket Club outside of School.

Well done to Max Morgan who took five wickets, including a hat trick maiden over, playing for Bromsgrove Boars U11s against Worcester Cricket Club. To add to this brilliant achievement, this is, so far, the highest number of wickets by one player in one game for this season’s league.



History

As part of their History topic, Year 6 enjoyed a great day at The Black Country Living Museum. They explored the depths of the mines and took a trip on a canal boat.



Championships

Following the H&WSAA County T&F Championships, three of our athletes have set new Championship records. Neave Colley (Junior Girls) in Shot, William Hapgood (Junior Boys) in 800m and Isabella Davies (Inter Girls) in 100m. Congratulations to all three pupils on their new county athletics records.

Netball

Many congratulations to our U12A team who were successful in beating Solihull School in the first round of the Sisters n Sport Cup competition. The girls played some super netball throughout the match and should be very proud of themselves.



Sports Tour

Over the summer, thirty-three of our netball players had the incredible opportunity to embark on a thrilling tour of Malaysia and Singapore. The adventure began in Kuala Lumpur, where the players were put through their paces in a training session at the Brainy Bunch Sports Complex. The teams then faced off in two sets of fixtures against Selangor Sports School and Titiwangsa Sports School. During their stay in Kuala Lumpur, the pupils explored some of the city's most iconic landmarks,

including the towering Petronas Towers, the stunning Batu Caves, and the exhilarating Sunway Lagoon water park. These cultural and recreational experiences added a rich layer of enjoyment to the tour, giving the pupils a deeper appreciation of Malaysia's vibrant culture.

The final leg of the tour took the teams to Singapore, where they were honoured to play against the Singapore National Netball teams at the prestigious OCBC National Stadium. In addition to the matches, the pupils experienced a night safari, visited the spectacular Gardens by the Bay, witnessed the Marina Bay Sands

light show, and underwent a professional training session. The tour concluded with a final set of fixtures against two local schools, rounding off a truly unforgettable experience.

Throughout the trip, our pupils were outstanding ambassadors for the School. They embraced the diverse cultures they encountered, competed strongly in the block fixtures against international teams, and returned with memories that will last a lifetime. We are incredibly proud of their achievements and the way they represented our School on the international stage.


Porridge




Parents' Reception
