A Word from the Headmaster

Recently, I came across the proverb: In time of test, family is best. Although we are preparing young people at Bromsgrove School to make their own way in the world — to live happy and fulfilled lives, and to make a difference to others — all of us need the support of those around us, just as we, in turn, support others. That is what families do, both when things are going well and when times are more testing.

Families come in many shapes and sizes. They may live together or be separated by great distances, but few are quite as large, or extend as far, as the Bromsgrove School family. Nevertheless, we hope that the School has a family feel and embodies family values. In response to the recent whole-school survey, one pupil wrote of their House: "I have only been in [my House] for about a year but I have loved every moment of it. The teachers are so kind, I get along with so many others in [my House], and it is very homely and comfortable."

As in any family, bonds are formed when we do things together. At this time of year, one such example is the Senior School House Song competition, when members of each House work together to combine their individual musical and dancing talents into a performance, in front of over a thousand peers, staff, and, of course, an adjudicator who has the unenviable task of picking winners. House Song this year was excellent, as always, and it was wonderful to see the joy on the faces of everyone involved.

I was also reminded of the enduring nature of family ties when I met Old Bromsgrovians in London recently. Although they have each followed different paths beyond School, memories and friendships were instantly rekindled when the OBs came together again. We hope that once young people join the Bromsgrove family, they remain connected. even long after they have left School.

And then, of course, there was the tragic loss of Namsong Rai, who passed away so young in early October. His death touched us all deeply and reminded us, once again, of the importance of those close to us, particularly when we are going through the toughest of times.

A school should be like a second family a place where we are known, supported, and encouraged to grow. Like a family, it brings together people of different ages, backgrounds, and talents, bound by shared values and genuine care for one another. Most importantly, it is where we belong.

The panel concluded that Sakura's political analysis showed clear ambition and a willingness to interrogate contemporary politics in a provocative and original way. The judges agreed that Sakura demonstrated a confident and imaginative political voice, with strong potential for a future scholarship.

Reception classes have brought 'The Colour Monster' to life with a vibrant and imaginative scarecrow creation. As part of PSHE lessons, the children explored a range of emotions, discussing what each one feels like and sharing personal examples of what makes them feel that way. This hands-on project provided a fun, creative, and collaborative way for the children to express their understanding of emotions while developing their teamwork skills.

Rugby Tour

During half-term, Mr Windo and Mr Colson took twenty-six Upper Fourth boys on a short rugby tour to Wales for a rugby packed weekend. The group stopped at Abergavenny RFC for a training session and some lunch before heading to their first game against Newport School. 
Free time in various places saw an inventive array of hats, local delicacies and souvenirs being purchased.


Mr Jones is very grateful to all the Bromsgrove colleagues and families who sponsored him.
