Performing Arts

This years' Performing Arts Scholars' evening showcased nearly fifty of the School's finest musicians and actors on stage or the concert platform, and this year, for the first time it included the new Lower Fourth scholars.

The performance began in Cobham Theatre with the Drama Scholars presenting five superb pieces, beginning with a sequence of very moving scenes from the RSC's recent adaptation of Hamnet. This was followed by excerpts from the wonderful Lancashire comedy. Hobson's Choice and the dramatization of the novel The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie. The first half was brought to a close with a more extended section from Timberlake Wertenbaker's awardwinning play *Our Country's Good* which follows the attempts of a group of convicts trying to stage a play in 18th Century Australia.

Particularly impressive was the accuracy and consistency of the dialect work from all performers, a deliberate move to truly stretch the scholars and broaden their acting skills; each scene was, as ever, produced to a very high standard and the Drama scholars showed themselves equally adept and confident in broad comedy as serious drama.

The Music Scholars' Concert which followed after the interval in Routh Concert Hall, was a triumph of individual and ensemble performance featuring all of the Senior Music Scholars. They gave superb performances of Classical era chamber music, a Romantic flute and piano duo, a Baroque Oratorio aria with string accompaniment, a cello quintet, a reimagined Lady Gaga classic, as well as virtuosic solo performances.











Tennis

Over half term, School held a LTA Grade 4 Tennis tournament. The week's event saw over 112 entries from across the UK, ranging from U8 through to Open (18+).

Fiona and Maria both received a Bromsgrove School Economics postcard in recognition of their work. After just five weeks of studying the subject, the future looks bright for the female economists at Bromsgrove School.

Race Report


The two Design Technology race car teams - the Chicken and the Egg attended the International Finals at Glorious Goodwood for the final race day of the season.




DT Drawings

Political Studies

A group of ten IB2 students went to Belfast and Londonderry as part of their Global Politics course. Students were able to gain an insight into the successes and ongoing challenges of the peace process and the difficulties of achieving reconciliation in a post-conflict society. Day one was spent in Londonderry where students visited the Free Derry museum and heard from relatives of those killed on Bloody Sunday. They also spoke with those whose lives were significantly impacted by The Troubles: including a former British Army Serviceman who completed two tours of duty in Northern Ireland; and a woman whose brother was shot and killed by the British Army due to his involvement with the IRA. On the second day, students enjoyed a tour of historic sites in Belfast city centre and West Belfast, before travelling on to Stormont where they were shown round the Assembly building and met with Naomi Long - leader of the Alliance Party and former Justice Minister.





Intense Training

Fourteen direct entry Gold Duke of Edinburgh participants travelled to Snowdonia for some fast-track expedition training. They learnt to survive and navigate in the mountains in preparation for their Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award training. For most of these students, there is a steep learning curve, as they have not experienced the trials of the Silver Award. With poor weather on the first day, they experienced the variety of conditions they can expect and how they can still enjoy the expedition. This was a tiring trip, but a welcome change from the usual School routine and in such beautiful surroundings.

Cross-Country

After the first round of the ESAA Cross-Country Cup all teams progressed to the regional finals.

The Junior girls, Junior boys and Intermediate boys were all successful in their competitions. The Junior boys finished second with both the girls and Intermediate boys teams becoming regional champions. Extra special praise must go to Martha Blower who won her race.

The teams now look forward to competing in the National finals in December.
