Thank you for all your continued support for the School and your children in particular. We look forward to more exciting events when term restarts on Monday.



Page House boarders enjoyed exploring the flora and fauna in the Rose Garden and learning how to frame and edit their shots in the sunshine.














House Paintballing

In the 3rd/4th play off, the girls battled hard but narrowly lost 1-0 to Repton A. Well done to all the team on an excellent day's hockey.

Mrs Gill Punt

The Headmaster's wife, Mrs Gill Punt, ran two World Marathon Majors in one week for Cancer Research UK. Mrs Punt has been raising funds and awareness for cancer charities for over two decades, since her father died of bile duct cancer, and to date she has raised over £1million.

First was the the London Marathon, during which Mrs Punt was interviewed several times - even as the race was being run - with A J Chalmers at Tower Bridge, then BBC London, ITV and Sky News.

This was followed by a trip across the Atlantic to Chicago, where Mrs Punt was one of 40,000 runners racing through twenty-nine neighbourhoods of the Windy City. Just one week after the London Marathon, she was doing it all over again, and to add to the challenge, she also represented GB at the International 5k the day before.



Mrs Punt says, "what a privilege to have competed in these challenges and to help Cancer Research UK in their quest to beat cancer".



Both events were exhilarating and she wishes to thank all those in the Bromsgrove community who have supported her.
