#### **ESSA**

A huge congratulations to the Years 5 and 6 swimmers who competed at the Ponds Forge swimming pool in Sheffield at the ESSA Primary Schools National Finals.

The boys' medley relay team came 4th in the heat and qualified through to the B final where they swam brilliantly to come 4th and therefore 12th overall in the country.

In the girls' freestyle relay the team came 5th in their heat but narrowly missed out on a final place, coming 17th overall.

In the boys' freestyle relay, they repeated their success and came 4th in their heat. That put them into the B final where, they again, placed 12th overall in the country. Very impressive considering three pupils in this team are in Year 5 and will have another chance to swim in

this competition next year.

Finally, despite the girls giving their all in the medley relay, they did not qualify for the final but should be very proud of swimming at such a high level.

Well done to all Bromsgrove swimmers for, yet again, reaching such a prestigious level of competition and representing the School in an excellent manner.

184 Upper Sixth students have confirmed their Firm and Insurance offers to UK universities via UCAS including offers to very competitive Russell Group Universities and other competitive UK and World universities, with over sixty students applying internationally on top of UCAS.

In the USA there has been significant success this year with offers from Columbia, Cornell, Dartmouth, Duke, Johns Hopkins and to UC schools.

Very competitive places have also been achieved in Canada as well as at HKU, cUHK, HKUST and Poly U in Hong

Kong and Thammasat University in Thailand.

More of our students are applying to Europe and receiving offers from universities in the Netherlands, France, Italy and Spain. We also wish our German students every success with their post IB results applications to universities such as LMU and TUM in Germany.

The Futures Team and Dr Thompson and Dr Tchakhotine will be available after all results are released in Mid August to give guidance to all IB, A level and BTEC pupils about their next steps.


# Cadets

Invited students took part in workshops which included 'How to Podcast', 'Entering Journalism', 'Cartoon creation' and 'Bookbinding' before a formal lunch and awards ceremony hosted by key figures from the publishing industry.
